# From Falcon Wings to Olympic Rings KPS Grad Seeks to Continue Olympic Dream

Nearly eight million students currently participate in high school athletics in the United States (according to NCAA research). Less than 6% of them will compete at NCAA schools, and of that group, only a select few compete professionally or at the Olympic level. Like her shot put ball, KPS alum Tia Brooks has thrown those stats to the wind. She continues to overcome the odds through dedication and high expectations.



"Tia is such a great role model for our students. She is the perfect example of the grit and growth mindset it takes to reach one's goals," said Superintendent Michael Zoerhoff.

After graduating from EKHS in 2008, Tia began her collegiate shot put career at the University of Oklahoma. After earning a host of collegiate championships and record-setting performances, Brooks continued to push herself to the next level. "I've learned that my talent is only going to take me so far." Brooks said in a recent interview with MLive's Peter Wallner. "I've learned a lot, as a person and as an athlete, and I've learned that I need to work harder if I want to develop." She placed 3<sup>rd</sup> at the U.S. trials in 2012 and finished 19<sup>th</sup> in the world at the Summer Games in London. Tia will train locally in preparation for the Olympic trials on July 7 in the hopes of securing a spot with the U.S team and returning to the Summer Games in Rio.

"Tia's story demonstrates the value of determination and grit that is foundational to success," EKHS Athletic Director Blaine Brumels said. "She inspires others to face challenges head on and work hard to achieve their dreams."

Best of luck Tia as you continue your Olympic dream. You continue to make your country and community proud!

#### EK Alum In The News



# **New Hearing Services Now Being Provided Through the Kent County Senior Millage**

Are you deaf, hard of hearing, or experiencing deafness in later years? Do you feel isolated because of not hearing well? Do friends or family members become impatient when you ask them to repeat comments or instructions?

If you answered yes to any of these questions, new services available through the Kent County Senior Millage may be the answer. Disability Advocates of Kent County (DAKC) is now providing specialized hearing services to adults 60 years or



older, living in Kent County. Hearing services include individual consultations, referrals to audiology services, a comprehensive hearing assessment, and assistance in obtaining hearing aids.

DAKC will also assist with the temporary loan or purchase of assistive technology or adaptive equipment, including a home evaluation provided by a Michigan licensed Occupational Therapist to assess daily living activities and the ability to function independently in the home. An individual service plan will be implemented, which includes equipment inspection, set up, and training.

#### Some examples of assistive devices that are available include:

- **Hearing Aids**
- Assistive Listening Devices which can be used with a hearing aid or cochlear implant to hear certain sounds better. An example of an assisted listening device is a product called the "Pocket Talker".
- Alerting Devices which connect to a doorbell, telephone, smoke detector, carbon monoxide systems, or alarms, and emit a loud sound or blinking lights.

"Adaptive equipment will empower independence, "says Trina Edmondson, Independent Living Program Manager for DAKC. Using adaptive equipment can result in increased safety and a greater sense of independence and security.
