When Elijah Lewis steps into his seventh and eighth grade English Language Arts classroom each morning at Valleywood Middle School, he sees a reflection of his own journey. A 2016 graduate of East Kentwood High School, Elijah is now in his second year of teaching, giving back to the same community and school district that shaped him.

"I would not be here without the support of Kentwood teachers," he said. "They worked with me differently. They didn't just send me out when I was having a hard day. They worked with me as a team, with my parents, and with me as a person. That made all the difference."

Elijah has strong roots at KPS. He began at Southwood Elementary, continued to Pinewood Middle School, and eventually graduated from East Kentwood High School. Along the way, he encountered teachers who saw his potential and invested in his growth, inspiring him to teach.

"I would not be here without the support of Kentwood teachers," he said. "They worked with me differently. They didn't just send me out when I was having a hard day. They worked with me as a team, with my parents, and with me as a person. That made all the difference."

"I remember watching my teachers in class and thinking, 'I could do that,'" he said. "The teachers I had showed patience, love, and purpose. I knew when I started teaching that I

wanted to bring that same energy back home."

Because of his time as both a student and now a teacher, Elijah realizes just how unique Kentwood is. "The diversity here is unmatched," he said. As a teacher, Elijah feels honored to guide students who are walking the



same hallways. "It's an honor and a privilege to talk to students now who are growing up in the same community I did," he said. "The camaraderie here is still strong. It's a family. I'm just grateful to be part of that and to pass on the same lessons and patience that were given to me."

For Elijah, teaching is more than a job. It's a calling. "I owe these kids and the teachers that had me," he said. "Every day, I try to make sure everything I do is intentional, out of love, and with purpose. I want my students to know that I've been there too, and I've got their back."

He brings that philosophy to life through connection and creativity in his classroom. "We mean business, but we also laugh and have fun," he said. "Students learn best when they're engaged when they see you taking the first step with them. I can't ask them to do something I'm not willing to do myself."

His approach has created a classroom culture that feels both rigorous and welcoming. "Our students here at Valleywood, and across Kentwood, are diverse.



dedicated, and full of potential," he said. "We have high standards, but we also have strong community support. When we come together for events, it's a celebration. That's what makes this district so special."

Despite the challenges that come with teaching, Elijah says he wouldn't trade it for anything. "I'm built for this job," he said with a smile. "This isn't busywork. It's meaningful work. I love it. Even when it's hard, I remind myself: this is what I'm meant to do."

When asked what he hopes his students will remember years from now, Elijah laughed. "They'll probably say, 'Mr. Lewis was crazy but in the best way," he said. "I hope they remember that we worked hard, we had fun, and that they always felt supported."

PINEWOOD STUDENTS EXPERIENCE FUTURE CAREERS IN STEM THROUGH COMMUNITY CONNECTION

Pinewood Middle School 6th graders recently received a powerful introduction to the future of science and technology, thanks to a community connection that brought classroom lessons to life. Our students were able to attend the Next Gen STEM Festival at Grand Rapids Community College a few weeks ago to experience a high-energy event dedicated to STEM learning and career exploration.

Our students were immediately immersed in interactive science through the dynamic displays run by the Mind Trekkers group. The Mind Trekkers is a nationally acclaimed STEM roadshow, run by Michigan Tech University students, bringing energetic, handson STEM festivals to communities around the country. These engaging educational activities transformed complex scientific principles into exciting, memorable experiences.

Students were also able to learn more about relevant careers available in STEM-related fields. By interacting with fun science displays, students moved beyond theoretical concepts to experience direct pathways into a possible career path. EXPANDING LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES AT MEADOWLAWN WITH A COLLEGE PARTNERSHIP

For the past three years, Meadowlawn Elementary School has partnered with Grand Valley State University's (GVSU) educational foundation class. In this class, college students who are thinking about being teachers complete 20 hours in a classroom to observe teaching strategies and practice working with students.

This semester there are 12 GVSU students placed with Meadowlawn teachers. They are observing teaching strategies, working with students on classwork, and helping during lunch and recess. The goal is beneficial to all: teachers share their expertise and model best practices, college students are provided with hands-on learning experiences, and elementary students benefit from extra support during the school day and learn a little more about what college is like.

This community partnership started when Brianna Vasquez de Pereira, Meadowlawn's Community School Coordinator, reached

out to Dr. Terry Stockton, GVSU Professor and Course Coordinator, who she had worked with in the past. She wanted to know if GVSU would be interested in expanding their school sites and adding Meadowlawn. After talking through the details together, Meadowlawn was the first elementary school in Kentwood Public Schools to pilot the program.

GVSU students share valuable feedback with Ms. Vasquez after they have completed their classroom hours. Many have shared how wonderful their experience was at Meadowlawn. One remarked, "I just wanted to let you know that I have completed my hours! I was just wondering if it would be ok to still volunteer a couple more times? I think this is a great experience and I have really enjoyed it!" Another commented, "Thank you so much for making this possible for us all, I know I had a ton of fun and learned a lot for my schooling going forward."
