One year after the official ribbon cutting, the Kentwood Public Schools Early Childhood Center Main Campus is buzzing with energy, growth, and opportunity. Among the many programs flourishing in the new space are the Thursday and Friday morning community playgroups — welcoming families from across the district to enjoy an hour of play, discovery, and connection.

The playgroups, held from 10 – 11 a.m., are open to all families with young children in our community, including children who are not yet of school age. Enrollment in other Early Childhood programs is not required for attendance. They offer a chance for little learners to explore, socialize, and grow—all in a safe and welcoming environment designed especially for them.

The KPS Early Childhood Center opened its main campus just one year ago as part of the 2021 Bond campaign. While the building houses the Great Start Readiness Program preschool classes and Early Childhood Special Education classes, the district also views it as a space for the entire community.

### **Building Strong Foundations Through Play**

The playgroups are led by teacher Emily Backus, who has dedicated her career to early childhood education. She knows firsthand how important the earliest years are for a child's growth.

"Early exposure is so important," Backus explained. "So much of brain development happens before age five. These playgroups give children a chance to engage in activities that build skills and curiosity. At the same time, families can take away ideas they can recreate at home."

Each session includes hands-on activities, music, and opportunities for social interaction. Children learn to clap, count, share, and explore new concepts—all through play. Parents and caregivers also benefit from connecting with one another, sharing experiences, and finding encouragement.

"I'm really proud of this program," Backus said. "I love the relationships I've built with families."

### Families Share the Joy

For many families, playgroup mornings have become a highlight of the week.

"She feels so excited to come here every Thursday and Friday," one parent shared. "Everyone is so friendly and welcoming."

Another parent added, "Honestly, it's a great opportunity. We feel blessed for it. It's such a good head start for my children to be in this environment where they can grow and learn."

Over the summer, our district implemented boundary changes to support the opening of the new Hamilton Elementary, and


with that came some significant shifts for Discovery. While our school looks a little different this year, the heart of Discovery remains the same—our commitment to every child's success.

## **COACH STEPHENSON INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME**

It's official — East Kentwood High School's own Coach Stephanie Stephenson has been inducted into the Michigan High School Coaches Association (MHSCA) Hall of Fame. In the spring, we shared that Stephenson had been selected for this prestigious honor. Last month, she was formally recognized during the MHSCA induction ceremony in Mt. Pleasant.

Stephenson's long and distinguished coaching career began in 1990 and brought her to East Kentwood in 1992. In addition to serving as head coach of the girls' track and field team, she continues to contribute as an assistant coach for the boys' cross-country team. Over the years, she has also coached softball and competitive cheer — demonstrating an enduring passion for mentoring student-athletes.

The MHSCA highlighted an extraordinary record of achievement under Stephenson's leadership. Her East Kentwood girls' track and field teams have earned:

- 11 OK Red Conference Titles
- 13 OK Red Conference Runner-Up Finishes
- 20 MHSAA Division 1 Regional Titles
- 1 MHSAA Division 1 State Runner-Up Title
- 5 MITCA Team State Championships



Her athletes have achieved remarkable individual success as well, with 243 MHSAA All-State honors, 26 state champions, 22 state runners-up, and 23 All-Americans — including standout names such as Tia Brooks (NCAA shot put champion and Olympian), Gabriela Leon (NCAA pole vault champion and Team USA), and Antoine Lloyd (NCAA hurdles runner-up).

Stephenson herself has been recognized 20 times as Regional Coach of the Year and twice as MITCA Division 1 Girls Track Coach of the Year. Beyond her competitive achievements, she has given back to the Kentwood community through volunteer work with the district's KIDS program, fifth-grade field days, and the Kentwood Track Club.
