



LEGACY OF EXCELLENCE: EK WE THE PEOPLE FINISHES #9 IN THE NATION

For the first time in nearly 30 years, the East Kentwood High School We the People team has earned a Top 10 national finish, placing #9 in the nation at the 2026 We the People National Finals competition in Washington, D.C.

Competing against the top 47 teams in the country, EK students represented Michigan on one of the nation's biggest stages for civic education. Approximately 1,200 students competed in front of 68 expert judges in a competition focused on history, philosophy, constitutional law, politics, and current events.

After two intense days of competition, East Kentwood advanced to the final top 10 round for the first time since 1997. Students then participated in extended championship hearings before ultimately finishing ranked #9 nationally — the highest finish by a Michigan school since 2015.

"This truly was a memorable season for this group, their coaches, and the KPS community that invested in their success!" said coach Justin Robbins.

The accomplishment capped off an already remarkable season for the team, which also earned district and state championships earlier this year.

All six EK units finished ranked 18th or higher nationally

in their specific content areas, including four units that finished in the national Top 10:

- **Unit 3:** Kian Bakri, Trinity Burch, and Ahmed Elkhwad — #2 nationally
- **Unit 2:** Brooklyn Berlin, Emma Johnson, and Christina Le — #5 nationally
- **Unit 6:** Soniya Bhattarai, Maribella Grzesiak, and Adelaida Pablo Pablo — #6 nationally
- **Unit 1:** Benjamin Huffine II, Edwin Lopez-Garcia, and Daniel Phan — #8 nationally

KPS BOND PROPOSAL APPROVED BY VOTERS

Kentwood Public Schools would like to thank the community for its partnership and support following the successful passage of the district's Safety and Success Bond Proposal on May 5.

The proposal was approved by voters with 56% voting in favor.

The bond proposal will support approximately \$125 million in district improvements focused on student safety, learning opportunities, and facility needs across the district. Planned projects include districtwide safety enhancements, expanded Career and Technical Education (CTE) and STEM learning opportunities, a new Valleywood Middle School, performing arts improvements, updates to

According to coaches, the team's success was fueled by an unprecedented level of commitment and preparation. Students combined for more than 502 hours of practice time outside of school since January, which is more than double the program's previous record.

"Team 39 committed to our process and program beliefs in a way that I have not seen before," Robbins said. "They always took on whatever we threw at them and exceeded our expectations going forward."

Preparation for the season began in May 2025, with students participating in summer Zoom sessions and beginning official preparation weeks before the school year started.

The success also reflects the long-standing tradition of the EK We the People program, now in its 40th season. Teams are numbered each year to honor the students and coaches who built the program over decades of excellence.

One of those longtime leaders is retired East Kentwood teacher Ken Ozanich, who has coached every EK We the People team since the program began.

For many students, the national competition also marked their first trip to Washington, D.C. In addition to competing, students toured historical sites and met with United States Representative Hillary Scholten during their visit.

"This year, Team 39 demonstrated that KPS can produce students who excel in an elite academic competition against the entire country when we support them to the best of our ability and they choose to embrace a process of finding out what they're capable of," Robbins said.

In last month’s district newsletter, we proudly highlighted Kentwood graduates who matched into medical residency programs. After going to press, we learned of one more outstanding alum to celebrate, one whose journey is bringing him back home.

Mwangi Wamaina (Bowen Elementary, Discovery Elementary, Crestwood Middle School, East Kentwood Freshman Campus), a 2016 graduate of East Kentwood High School, has matched into the Internal Medicine Residency Program through Corewell Health and Michigan State University. He will primarily train at Butterworth Hospital, returning to Grand Rapids to serve the very community that helped shape him.

After graduating from EK, Wamaina attended Oakwood University, where he majored in biochemistry. He later worked as a medical scribe in a cardiology and pulmonology clinic before earning his medical degree from the University of Illinois College of Medicine Rockford.

“It was amazing to finally know where I will be at for residency,” Wamaina shared. “I am looking forward to coming back to Grand Rapids and serving the community where I was raised.”

Wamaina hopes to become a cardiologist and credits Kentwood Public Schools for helping shape his path.
