



KPS CARES:

TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT RECOGNIZED FOR LIFESAVING ACTIONS

A special recognition took place at the December Kentwood Public Schools Board of Education meeting as Superintendent Kevin Polston, along with board members and the KPS Central Office Team, honored the caring and proactive actions of the district's Technology Department, actions that ultimately saved a life.

The recognition stemmed from an incident involving Technology Department Network Engineer Mike Lepeak. One morning in early October, Lepeak did not arrive for an 8:00 a.m. meeting and did not call or message to indicate he would be late or absent. That was out of character for him. Concerned colleagues attempted to reach him by phone and text but received no response.



As the meeting began, Executive Director of Technology Evan Hordyk said it "just didn't feel right" not being able to connect with Lepeak. He asked some members of the department to

head to Mike's home to check on him, and some to connect with the KPS Security Department.

When technology staff arrived at Lepeak's home, they immediately sensed something was wrong. His car was in the driveway, music could be heard inside, but no one answered the door. Police and paramedics were called to the scene and discovered Lepeak unconscious on the floor near the entrance to his bedroom. He was suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Lepeak was found just in time.

"The paramedics told me," Lepeak shared in a recent interview, "that I probably only had about 45 minutes left if I had remained in my home."

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Paramedics were able to revive him in the ambulance on the way to the hospital, where he spent three days recovering. Fortunately, Lepeak is now doing well and has returned to work in Kentwood.

The incident was traced to an issue with his furnace that he had been unaware of. Lepeak hopes his experience serves as an important reminder about carbon monoxide safety.



"You truly can't smell it, or you can't taste it," Lepeak explained in talking about what happened. Although he had a carbon monoxide detector in his home, he was unable to hear it due to

where it was located. Since then, the fire department has installed updated and additional detectors in his home, something Lepeak strongly encourages others to consider. (Additional carbon monoxide safety tips can be found on page 3.)

Lepeak also shared his appreciation for the caring culture at Kentwood Public Schools.

"I've worked in a lot of places," Lepeak said, "and I can tell you it is not as likely in those other places that someone would have checked on me and my wellbeing."

"Kentwood has just been so overly inviting. It has truly felt like a family," Lepeak explained. "It has really felt like home."

Lepeak credits the genuine, caring nature of the close-knit team that works in the technology department for acting when things didn't feel quite right. "For them to notice and to take action, literally made the difference," he said.

Lepeak, who has worked in KPS for three years, added that this sense of care extends far beyond his department. He says, as he travels around the district for his work, he feels this throughout the KPS community.

"Kentwood has just been so overly inviting. It has truly felt like a family," Lepeak explained. "It has really felt like home."

FALCON ESPORTS SOARS AT STATE PLAYOFFS

East Kentwood High School's Falcon Esports program delivered an outstanding performance at the MIHSEF Esports State Playoffs, held Saturday, December 13, at the University of Michigan–Flint. The event featured **more than 400 student competitors representing over 50 high schools** from across Michigan, and East Kentwood once again proved why it is recognized as one of the premier esports programs in the state—and the nation.

The Falcons captured their **sixth consecutive Valorant State Championship**, continuing a remarkable dynasty led by team captain **Andi Haska**. East Kentwood also secured its **second state championship in Rainbow Six**, with **Grant Songer** serving as team captain. These victories further cement EK's reputation for excellence across multiple esports titles.

In addition to the championships, Falcon Esports earned two impressive runner-up finishes. The **Mario Kart team**, captained by **Reuben Starnes and Y-Tien Le**, raced their way to a **state runner-up** finish, while earlier in the week the **Splatoon team**, led by their captain **Jackie DeVries**, also claimed **state runner-up honors**.

With these results, Falcon Esports has now amassed an incredible **22 state championships and 10 state runner-up finishes since 2019**. This sustained success recently earned East Kentwood High School national recognition, as the program was ranked **#14 esports program in the country by USA Today**.

"I couldn't be prouder of how our students represented East Kentwood on the biggest stage," said coach **Bill Dixon**. "Their teamwork, preparation, and sportsmanship were on full display, and the results speak for themselves. This success is about more than winning. It's about giving students opportunities to grow, compete, and belong."

As the fall season concludes, the **winter esports season begins with the start of second semester**, bringing new games, new teams, and new opportunities for students across the district to get involved. With momentum like this, the future of Falcon Esports looks brighter than ever.

KENTWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT OFFERS TIPS ON CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY

In response to the situation involving our staff member and carbon monoxide poisoning, Kentwood Public Schools reached out to the Kentwood Fire Department to learn about safety tips to share with our community.

First, the Kentwood Fire Department shared that they, along with surrounding fire departments for their communities, will install a carbon monoxide detector at no charge in Kentwood homes. If you are a Kentwood homeowner and would like a carbon monoxide detector, and/or a smoke detector, installed in your home, you may call 616.554.0803 or [complete an online form using this link](#) to set up an appointment. The Kentwood Fire Department adds that they are happy to provide life-saving devices to Kentwood residents.

The department notes that, for rental properties, residents need to contact their landlords regarding installation of detectors as they are required to do so.

In addition, the fire department shared some useful information provided by the American Red Cross regarding carbon monoxide safety. Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind according to the American Red Cross:

- Make sure all gas appliances are vented properly.
- Have all heating systems inspected and serviced annually by a professional using a portable CO detector.
- Never leave a car running inside a garage, even if the garage door is open.
- Do not use a gas range or oven to heat your home.

FRESHMAN CAMPUS PUTS PEN TO PAPER TO CREATE A CARING ENVIRONMENT

At the Freshman Campus, students and staff are putting "KPS Cares" into daily action in meaningful, tangible ways. This fall, our Falcons launched a schoolwide gratitude initiative, reminding one another that kindness, appreciation, and connection are powerful parts of learning.

Each week, students focused on a different group to thank. One week, they wrote gratitude notes to their former middle school teachers, reflecting on the people who helped them get to high school and naming specific ways those teachers made a difference. Another week, students wrote to a friend—someone who has supported them, made them laugh, or helped them through a tough moment. On a third week, students chose a current EKFC staff member to thank, from teachers and office staff to custodians, lunch staff, and support personnel, reminding the adults in the building that their hard work is noticed and valued.



Staff are also modeling care and appreciation for one another. ENDEAVOR CELEBRATES MATH SUCCESS

Over the past year and a half, Endeavor staff have engaged in a deep dive into implementing our new math curriculum and strengthening our Professional Learning Community (PLC) work. This focus is already showing positive results for students. When we look back at student proficiency, we are encouraged by the progress made so far this year.

Compared to this same point last year, we are seeing nearly a 5% increase in the number of students performing on or above grade level in math. This growth reflects stronger alignment to grade-level expectations and more consistent instructional practices across classrooms.

We are also seeing encouraging gains in student growth. At the midpoint last year, the median improvement score was approximately 54%. This year, that number has increased to about 62%, representing an 8% increase in typical growth. This progress tells us that our staff and students' hard work is bringing results.

Looking ahead to the second half of the year, we remain focused on building momentum. Through continued collaboration, targeted instruction, and support for every learner, we are confident that students will continue to grow as mathematicians.

COMMUNITY WEIGHS-IN ON FUTURE FACILITIES PLANNING FOR KENTWOOD PUBLIC SCHOOLS

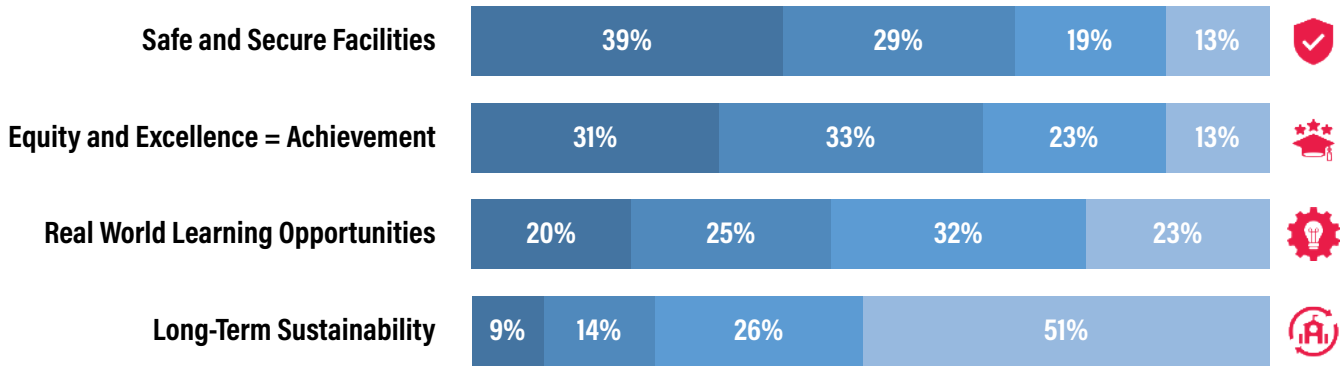

Safety + Success Ranked as Key Themes

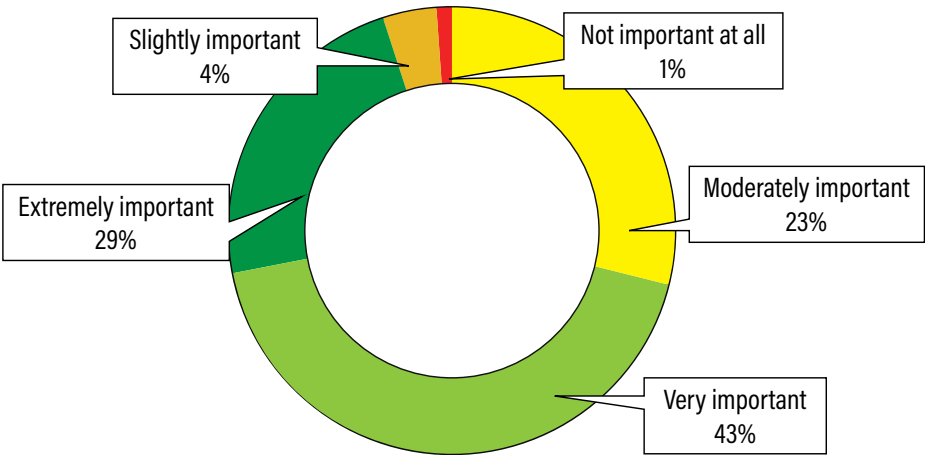

Importance of Middle School in Future Planning

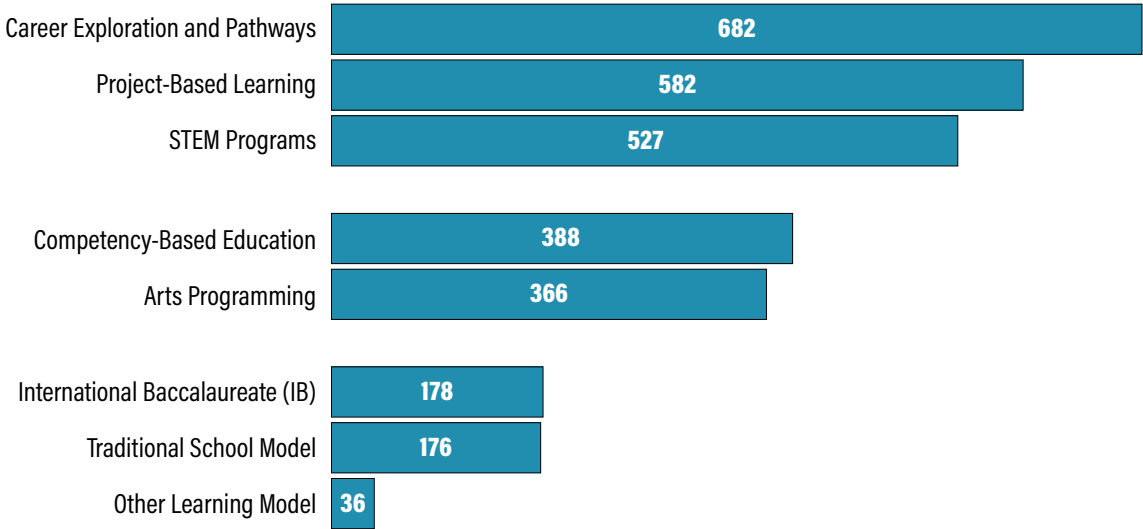




REAL-WORLD LEARNING MODELS TOP LIST OF POSSIBILITIES
