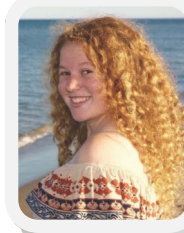
# Top 10 Seniors!

Participated in cross country and track for four years, DECA for three years, a two-year member of NHS, and competed on the We The People Constitution Team. Is a Chief Petty Officer in

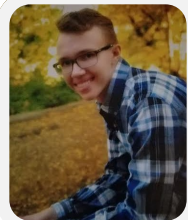
the US Naval Sea Cadet Corps. Will attend the US Naval Academy pursuing a political science major hoping to commission into the Navy as a Flight Officer.

Participated in varsity tennis as a team captain and in NHS as a lead tutor. Also participated in Business Professionals of America, qualifying

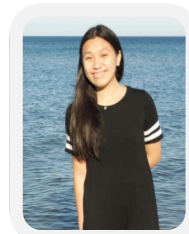
for the national competition. Is an AP Scholar with distinction. Plans to attend U of M LSA Honors college to study mathematics.

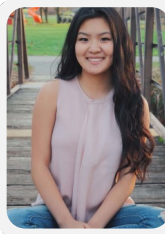
majoring in biology on a pre-med track in hopes of becoming a physician.

## Discovery and Glenwood PEAKS are Growing Produce from the Air Up

Fifth grade students are growing up—with leafy, green plants on their Tower Garden. Bib and gourmet lettuce, basil, rainbow chard, peppers and cucumbers are sprouting nearly as fast as the students' scientific knowledge.



The Tower Garden, a product of the company Juice Plus, is beginning to flourish—each student has a plant. The project gives students

a chance to try their green thumbs at indoor farming, as part of the district's gifted and talented PEAKS program. They regularly measure and test the pH balance of their plants, keeping track of their data and observations in journals on Google Docs.

Students visited Koetsier's Greenhouse, in Grand Rapids Township, to learn about different farming methods. They studied the technology, created a business plan, and raised the funds through a Go Fund Me page and a Kentwood Education Association grant. They celebrated with a "Salad Party."



## Meadowlawn's EL Staff Celebrated Their Diversity

Meadowlawn's EL staff organized an amazing event in March. Students and staff raised money for the Refugee Education Center by collecting coins from the pickle sale held at lunchtime.

The month ended with a celebration of diversity highlighted with a Parade of Nations. All students were invited to represent their country of origin by carrying flags and dressing in traditional clothing. At the end of the parade, \$325 was raised for the REC!

## Bowen ARCH Competed at Jump Jam

On Saturday, April 22, a group of ten Bowen ARCH students competed at the fifth annual Jump Jam Competition. It was held at Devos Place in downtown GR and was sponsored by Spectrum Health. The kids worked really hard for nine weeks on their jump roping skills and had a great time competing with over 500 students from over 30 schools.

Glenwood's IMPACT group was in charge of the April character trait assembly on Determination. The whole school had the privilege of hearing Elizabeth Stone's story. She was born in the country of Georgia with only a small part of one of her legs and was adopted by a single mom in Grand Rapids when she was 4. She learned to swim and worked hard to get faster. ## Townline Participates in the NASA Stem Challenge

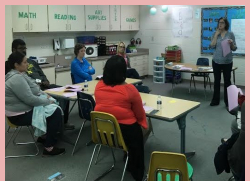
Townline's 4th and 5th grade ARCH students kicked off their spring break by participating in the NASA Stem Challenge Showcase in Lansing held on March 30

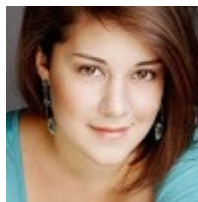

He gave up some of his spring break to represent Pinewood.



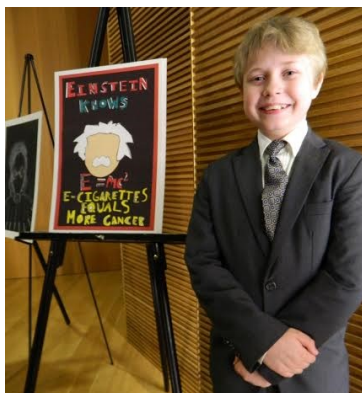
## WoodTV8's Maranda Show at Crestwood

### Am I a Caregiver?

Being a caregiver is one of the most difficult roles to fulfill, yet with the population of people age 60+ continuing to grow, it is a role that 1 in 3 people find themselves taking on. Some of us are thrust into caregiving due to an illness or an accident. Oftentimes though, we discover that the caregiving role has crept in and slowly taken over our lives.

It might start out simple – taking a loved one to the grocery store on occasion. Then occasionally turns into every Wednesday at 3:00p along with doctors' appointments several times a month. On these trips you notice difficulties with money or paperwork, so you double-check their bills, discover they are overpaying, and now you're a shopper, bill payer, and health advocate. Sarah Sobel, L.M.S.W, Caregiver Resource Coordinator at Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan observes, "When I talk with caregivers, often times I go through some daily living tasks and I ask them about how much assistance they are providing to their loved one with these activities. Many caregivers don't realize how much they are providing assistance on a daily basis until it is reflected back to them." We discover we've become a caregiver and didn't even know it.

What starts out as lending a hand gradually grows into another job. The National Alliance for Caregiving estimates that caregivers spend at least 20-hours per week caring for a loved one. Yet, many people in this position still don't consider themselves caregivers, especially if their loved one continues to reside in their own home. We regard these tasks as the duties or responsibilities that a spouse, a child, a parent, or even a friend undertakes for a person they love.

Fulfilling the duties of caregiver without recognizing that we are a caregiver, can result in stress, anger, and ultimately burnout, putting our own health and wellbeing at risk. Sobel says, "This is why I encourage caregivers to build a village – whether formal or informal – for the times when caregiving becomes hard to handle. Do they have a friend they can call to sit with their loved one while they take a walk? Maybe their loved one is a good candidate for an adult day program where they might receive some attention and the caregiver can have some time off to take care of themselves." When we recognize ourselves as caregivers, we embrace that we are going above and beyond typical expectations, and we also then come to understand that taking care of ourselves is paramount to our being able to take care of others.

This realization also opens doors to resources that can help support us in our new role. "An important part of my work at Area Agency on Aging of Western Michigan," Sobel shares, "is to provide the caregivers with education. These classes are a great way for caregivers to come together and learn about some of the issues they are facing." Taking advantage of the resources available in our communities helps caregivers build that "village" Sobel says is important, "In these classes, caregivers can come together – to share with each other about their experiences" and begin building a support network. Getting connected to resources early can also help us assess the growing needs of the person we're caring for and, if necessary, get connected to professional caregiving services.
