Chools across the nation are celebrating Teacher Appreciation Week in May. At Kentwood, our teachers are worth celebrating! Teachers and staff have a significant daily impact on students in classrooms, in extra-curricular activities, and even throughout the hallways of Kentwood Public Schools.

At Crestwood Middle School, Rashawn McClanahan loves his job. When stepping into his classroom, his commitment is obvious. The classroom is student-centered and welcoming. There are spaces intentionally designed to provide optimal and varied learning opportunities for students. A piano keyboard is displayed, front and center, just in case McClanahan decides to liven up a lesson with some music.

When you sit down and talk with McClanahan his love for his job is even more apparent. "I love working with kids," he exclaims. "I love making them happy. I love seeing them thrive as I lead the class."

At Meadowlawn Elementary, first grade teacher Kallie Derrer also loves her profession. She greets each of her students in a warm, genuine manner every single morning — evidence of her love and care for the students. At times, she brightens her students' day by dressing like Cindy Lou Who. Kallie is intentional about making sure her young students are growing as learners. "I do it for the kids," Derrer explains when asked why she teaches. "I just love that day-to-day interaction with them."

Teachers like these are making a difference in the lives of each student. "The research is very clear," says Superintendent Kevin Polston. "The most impactful factor on student achievement is their teacher(s). This is especially true at Kentwood Public Schools due to the

strong relationships our teachers create with students and families and their deep commitment to our students' success."

Kentwood Public Schools teachers understand the responsibility involved in serving our students. They realize that



established relationships combined with engaged learning leads to a successful future.

"I want them to remember that I cared about them," shares Crestwood's McClanahan, "and I did my best to serve whatever needs they had so that it could inspire them to do the same."

The love McClanahan and Derrer have for their work is shared by teachers across the district. It is also evident in the efforts teachers put into instruction.

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THE MULTILINGUAL TEAM AT GLENWOOD IS MULTITALENTED!

It's not every day you walk into your morning meeting and see a woman acting out the love story of a bird and whale in a different language, unless you work with Glenwood multilingual instructor Heidi Morrison. Morrison has taught ESL classes for the past 12 years and is one part of a superstar team. Heidi, her first-year teaching partner, Maxine Osorio, and longtime multilingual paraprofessional Melanie Mouw are dedicated to supporting Glenwood's multilingual students. It is indisputable that our multilingual team goes above and beyond in service to our families. They stay busy decorating their classrooms for an array of multicultural holidays, make certain every one of their students is properly geared up for the winter, visit homes to support parents, and of course ensure that their students see themselves in both their classrooms and their gen-ed classrooms.

While each member of the team goes above and beyond to support their students, each instructor was inspired to focus on multilingual education for vastly different reasons. Morrison's love of different cultures and languages prompted her to begin teaching EL. After spending years working in Indonesia, Mouw felt at home in the multicultural environment of KPS, and Osorio knew as a first generation Mexican American that she wanted her students to have an instructor that understood what it meant to be multilingual and all the nuances it brought.

When the team was asked what they wish others understood about being a multilingual teacher, two themes emerged. First, there is a lot more that goes into the job than "just teaching English". Second, the differences that our students bring are actually assets — our responsibility as educators is to figure out how to use them.

Glenwood is looking forward to our upcoming Parade of Nations on April 20th, marking Morrison's 10th Parade of Nations. Surprisingly, this will be Osorio's first, as a KPS Alumni. She is looking forward to seeing her students excited for an opportunity she knows her younger self would have cherished.

Thank you to Mrs. Morrison, Ms. Osorio, and Ms. Mouw for all the work you do!




CONGRATULATIONS SOUTHWOOD SPACE KIDS!

The judges must have agreed because the team won Honorable Mention at the Roger That! Design That! Challenge that took place in February at GVSU. Bowen Elementary contains the district's MoCl Program for elementary aged children. This program is designed to meet the needs of students with Moderate Cognitive Impairments (MoCl). Our program includes children with Down Syndrome, DeGeorge Syndrome and other health impairments. Under the direction of Alaina Allen, Jessica Serrell and Jenna VanderPloeg, the MoCl Program is committed to eliminating barriers by focusing on daily living skills, social skills and academic growth to allow our students to reach their fullest potential.

With a combined 20+ years of teaching experience, our MoCI Team uses their knowledge and expertise to design experiences to meet the individual needs of our students. Through accommodations and modifications, academic growth and relationship building are more attainable. These experiences include a Reading Buddies program that aligns students with their general education peers to engage in the joy of reading. In partnership with the East Kentwood High School MiCI Program, students engage in arts and crafts, team building and learning activities. Allen, Serrell and VanderPloeg work hard to include our entire Bowen student body in celebrating the unique differences of the MoCI program through spirit days such as World Down Syndrome Day. On this day, students wore mismatched socks to represent the extra chromosome that makes our children with Down Syndrome so unique.

Through practices such as these, and daily inclusion in the general education learning environment, our students with moderate cognitive impairments are teaching our student body empathy and compassion for one another. Students are building lasting friendships and learning new ways to communicate with each other. It has become the mission of our MoCI team to provide excellence and equity in education for all students.

PINEWOOD STEM PROJECTS

This year Pinewood students have had the opportunity to take enrichment classes focused on STEM concepts. We would like to recognize two of our amazing teachers who have gone above and beyond to develop engaging and exciting hands-on activities for students to help them gain a deeper understanding of some very complex subjects.

First, Ms. Amr developed a boat race unit where students worked collaboratively to design a watercraft using everyday items. Throughout the unit her students were challenged to use their Science, Technology, Engineering and Math skills to research and develop a buoyant vehicle that would carry at least one passenger. Our students' hard work and creativity were then put to the test at the end of the marking period when they had an opportunity to participate in an actual race against their classmates at the EKHS pool. The boat race unit this year was a huge success and lots of fun! Many thanks to Ms. Amr for creating such an interesting and engaging activity that is certain to have a positive impact on students for years to come.



Ms. Hewitt also created units where students would learn about STEM-related concepts, then apply their learning and creativity to build various projects using Legos as a learning tool. In one unit, students were challenged to work collaboratively to research a topic, then to produce a stop-motion video using technology and Legos to build each scene. In the other, students were asked to build a vehicle out of Legos, then to customize it to enhance its performance after a series of experiments. Students shared that they really enjoyed the lessons and to have the ability to use their imagination and be creative with their projects.
